AN APPEAL TO DOG OWNERS

We own the footpath which runs from the village main road to the 'Christmas tree' field, adjacent to our house, Mayfield, We regularly check the footpath and remove branches that have fallen from the overhanging trees, cut back the weeds in summer, cut the hedges in late summer and put down bark chippings to try and stop the path becoming too muddy.

Over the space of one recent weekend we removed seven different piles of dog mess from the path. This is not a pleasant task and one we should not have to do, as it is now a legal requirement for all dog owners to dear up after their dog immediately their dog has defecated on any public open space within the Test Valley area. This legal requirement was introduced on the 14 November 2006 as a result of The Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 being adopted by Test Valley Borough Council. Penalties for failing to comply with this requirement are fixed penalty fines of £75 (£50 payable within seven days). Failure to pay the fine within 14 days may lead to a summary conviction with fines up to £1,000.

Over the last few weeks we have spoken to many of the regular dog owner/walkers u sing the footpath who are aware of the regulations and say that they do not allow their dogs to foul the footpath. We are very grateful to them and hope their good example will rub off, eventually, on the irresponsible minority of dog owners who are ignoring the new regulations.



NEWS FROM TESTBOURNE

Behind the usual school scenes we have been busy trying to make a success of a one-off opportunity to improve our facilities. As many of you may know, we have been hoping to sell a small plot of unused land on the school site to fund these improvements. We have actually been working towards this for a number of years. We carried out an initial local consultation, applied for permission to sell from the Secretary of State for Education, met changing criteria, drew up and amended plans and finally submitted our planning application before Christmas. In drawing up the plans with Hampshire County Council we bore in mind the need to be considerate towards the local community, keeping the scale of any development very modest, maintaining trees and greenery for privacy and ensuring it included much-needed affordable housing.

We want Testbourne to be the best place it can be - providing the best education for the young people in our area, with excellent facilities which we can share with the local community. We have an old site with buildings which have dev eloped over time, making it hardfor us to have the physical "wow" factor which we believe our pupils and community deserve and which many other schools are able to offer. With the proceeds from the land sale we would have the means to make a big difference, creating a performing arts "hub", with a welcoming foyer, a proper dance/fitness studio and a theatre

hall with proper seating - all available for the community to use and share. This would also release much-needed classroom space to enable us to cater for the increased number of pupils we now have

We understand that some local residents are concerned about the traffic congestion which occurs in Micheldever Road, particularly at school opening and closing times, and this has regrettably led them to object to the planning application. As the proposed development only includes eight dwellings the Highways Survey concluded that this would have little or no impact on the current situation but we appreciate that traffic congestion can be a nuisance. We, therefore, have a travel plan which will provide a safe, convenient alternative droppingoff point and drastically reduce the number of cars in Micheldev er Road at school opening and closing times.

I wanted to take this opportunity to provide more information about the bigger picture and what we are trying to achieve. I hope this explains our determination to work with the local community, solve the traffic problem and bring about something really special for us all to share and be proud of. ADMISSIONS

Many local parents of Year 6 pupils recently received their letter telling them which secondary school their child will be attending in September. Previously we have been able to offer places to all families who made us their first choice but this year have found ourselves quite heavily oversubscribed, partly as a result of the new equal preference system. We are pleased that so many children do want to come to Testbourne but very sorry for those we have had to disappoint.

PERFORMING ARTS SUCCESSES

- Our quite newly formed orchestra made their first public performance at our Spring concert in March. Pupils, including a number of Year 7s, delighted us with their rapidly expanding repertoire, including part of Mahler's First Symphony and the stirring theme from Pirates of the Caribbean. They have been working in partnership with members of the Southern Sinfonia Orchestra and it was heart-warming to hear the progress they have made and see their pride and enjoyment in playing.
- Other pupils have been learning new film skills as a result of a partnership with Panasonic. They have formed a 'Kid Witness News' team and produced afour-minutefilm with training and equipment donated by the company. Their film, entitled, "Won't Listen ... Can't Hear", is a mini-documentary on the dangers of listening to loud music. It has already won first prize in a regional Media 4 Schools competition and will compete nationally when it is shown at the UK Youth Parliament in Birmingham in April.
- New Courses on offer from September pupils will have the opportunity to take a BTEC Diploma in Performing Arts with some very keen to follow the technical and production route.
- April 22nd our next Dance entry in the Global Rock Challenge - aimed at giving a "drug free high".

WATCH OUT DRAGONS' DEN!

Early this year, a group of Year 10 pupils set up a company called "Party Smartys" as part of the Young Enterprise Scheme. They appointed their Managing Director, developed their idea ~ a party pack for young children, sold shares and have now marketed their "product" at a Young Enterprise Fair in Basingstoke. OBITUARY

CHARLES COLIN BERWICK 28.08.34 - 03.01.08



More than 150 people filled St. Nicholas Parish Church on 19th March, to pay their final respects to Colin, and to extend their fulsome tributes to a man who was much loved and admired by many.

Educated at Kings

Wimbledon and All Hallows in Devon, he was accepted at Guys Hospital Medical School, where he qualified as a Dental Surgeon in 1959. He joined the Royal Navy on a Short Service Commission, was appointed to complete the Commando Course - which entitled him to wear the Green Beret - and joined 42 Commando as they were deployed to Malaya in anti terrorist operations. In 1962 there was an uprising in Brunei, and L Company 42 Commando and two minesweepers were despatched to resolve the conflict. Colin was appointed to the Field Hospital – the British Army's equivalent of the American MASH.

He completed his tours of duty, and returned to the UK to join his father and his brother at the family practice in London, from which he also launched a second practice in Streatley on Thames.

His association with the Navy continued as he spent over thirty years with the Royal Naval Reserve in Southampton where, as a Surgeon Captain he was appointed ADC and Honorary Dental Surgeon to Her Majesty the Queen, the highest rank in his specialisation. He was also awarded the Reserve Decoration for service to the RNR and was later awarded a bar to that decoration. He and Stephanie moved to Longparish in August 1997.

An avid sailor, he sailed his own boat, and others, in many seas worldwide. He played hockey with huge enthusiasm, was always ready to host a party, and adored his family with a passion. Tributes during the Memorial Service echoed a common theme. Fun and a degree of mayhem were balanced by love and admiration for Colin who had an amazing capacity for work and an amazing capacity to help others in need - a man with a calm thoughtful disposition, driven by a superb brain and a wonderful heart.

His acid wit and amazing sense of humour, indeed his telling of tales was second to none, and his laughter was infectious to say the least. To seek him out in a crowded room was not hard because he would be the one in the middle of the circle surrounded by people jostling to hear his clever funny stories. His insight into human nature was legend; he was a gentleman in both senses of the word.

He bore his illness with courage and dignity, and will be forever loved and missed by his wife Stephanie, his daughters Karen, Sarah and Jane, and his four grandchildren – Adam, Tom, Nathan and Georgina.

East Aston Common

You will recollect from the November and December editions of Hill & Valley that Mr & Mrs Tacchi applied to the Secretary of State for the common rights over approximately 20 acres of common land at East Aston Common (mainly comprising river bed and islands) to be extinguished in exchange for them granting new common rights over approximately 33 acres of meadow land (known as Nether Regions and Bank) on the East side of the B3048 to the East of East Aston. The main issue is the complex balance between preserving and improving the natural environment and public access under the Countryside and Rights of Way (CROW) Act. The Planning Inspectorate returned the application for technical reasons and they have recently advised that, "There is no current application". It is open to Mr & Mrs Tacchi to make a fresh application under new rules which apply from September 2007.
