The 90th Anniversary of the Armistice ending the First WorldWar was marked by a very special concert. The advertisement gives the basic information but what was it really like?

A personal account of an emotional experience

How do you start to put together a programme to commemorate the 90th Anniversary of Armistice? I wouldn't have a clue but am very grateful to everyone involved for assembling a truly fitting tribute to the Armistice. The 'eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month'.

My 'experience' didn't start well. After a rush to get home, numerous distractions and interruptions whilst trying to get out of the house and a jog across the field with my wife Anne from Forton to St. Nicholas Church came the dreaded thought - 'did we turn the grill off?' Given the history of our cottage [it is one of a row of three burned down as a result of a frying pan fire in 1988. Ed] there was no alternative - go back and check. So I did and yes, as usual it was off, hence the lack of comment on the opening.

What I walked into, not uncharacteristically late, was very moving. A packed church and the combined choirs of St. Mary Bourne & Longparish delivering a moving rendition of Fauré's Requiem introto a captivated audience. I sneaked in, hopefully quietly and relatively unnoticed.

I wasn't really prepared for the emotionally charged experience that was to follow. I know it was a choral concert but I was stunned by the quality of the readings by Rachel and Derek. So appropriate for the occasion and yet so beautifully delivered.

My focus turned to the photo presentation; I noticed that everyone looked like my late Grandad, a veteran of the campaign with the trademark moustache. I looked later and they were of my Uncle Bill, a WW2 veteran, who was critically ill at the time but despite that was still sporting a trademark 1940 version of the same moustache.

The rest of my evening turned into my very own personal journey of Remembrance. Probably my first truly absorbing Remembrance Concert, for a whole host of reasons.

The combined choirs, the soloists, and everyone involved should be very, very proud of what they achieved. A moving and exceptional programme delivered with a level of intensity that is difficult to describe and unbelievably

inspired me to volunteer for the choir! I am grateful and I am sure that the entire audience were grateful for a special evening. More importantly, we had the opportunity to demonstrate collectively our gratitude to those that we remember. Sadly Uncle Bill of the 3rd Tank Regiment passed away the following day.

A performer's perspective

Music can have a tremendous effect on our mood. According to neurologists, that warm feeling that people get when they hear a rousing piece of music or when they sing together in a large choir is the result of chemicals released by the brain. Whatever the explanation, singing at the Remembrance Day concert was a wonderful experience!

Fired up by some very positive feedback after its performance at the Summer Fun Day, when Bohemian Rhapsody was such a hit, the Choir started practicing in earnest for the concert in September. But I for one hadn't bargained for the complexity of classical choral pieces, and when faced with the Fauré's Requiem – in Latin – I almost bowed out gracefully! Still, we persevered and Cathy (who has the patience of a saint!) managed to coach us towards at least an approximation of the right notes, in the right ordernot an easy task, considering many of us can't actually read music. We linked up with the St Mary Bourne Choir only a week or so before the concert and felt pretty relieved (and a little inadequate!) when we heard their sopranos reaching the top notes that we had been struggling with.

On the night itself, the Church was packed and it was wonderful to see so many people there, not least because the collection raised £600 for the Ex-Services Mental Welfare Charity, Combat Stress. Henry had put together a fantastic set of slides showing various images from World War 1, from Kitchener's famous recruitment poster to photographs of Longparish's own Memorial to the fallen. Expertly timed to coincide with the various musical offerings and interspersed with readings imaginatively performed by Rachel Foote and Derek Kane, they created an atmosphere of solemnity and poignancy entirely appropriate to the occasion. Although I certainly wasn't note-perfect on the night, somehow any mistakes and flaws diminish when you sing with other people and it was an amazing feeling to realise that, in just a few short weeks, we had transformed from a hesitant bunch of singers into a fully-fledged choir. We even managed to get those top notes in the Benedictus!

Of course we are extremely lucky to have some real talent in our midst - Anna Bennett's beautiful soprano solo had a few people scrabbling for their hankies, I noticed; everyone in the choir felt safe and secure knowing that Robin was providing the organ accompaniment and the addition of Nicky on the flute and Kevin on the bugle was the icing on the cake. Our very own Maestro's Cathy and Nigel (with Richard Anning) performed magnificently and, of course, special mention should go to Lucy Smith for assisting Robin, and Alistair Chapman for his wonderful bass solo.

If you were there on the night, I do hope you enjoyed listening to the music as much as we all enjoyed performing it. If you weren't able to attend you may be interested to know that you can listen to a recording of the concert and view the accompanying slides on the Longparish website (www.longparish.org.uk). Sadly Jack passed away at the beginning of November and we extend our sympathy to Cath, Gareth, Rhidian and their families at this sad time. Jack will always be remembered with great affection by his many cricketing friends.

Village Hall

A very well attended Village Hall Committee meeting considered a "wish list" for refurbishing the Village Hall. This included a new and improved heating system, modern insulation throughout, new windows, updated and modern toilets, disabled facilities, modernised kitchen, more flexible use of space and a warmer and cosier feel to the whole building. Facilities such as a permanent screen for films, blackout options, an office, wi-fi, a hearing loop system, a larger stage, a dedicated room for Kidzone are all on the list and it is hoped to include as many as possible if at all possible.

Constraints facing the Committee in their quest to refurbish and update the hall and its facilities include the access to the rear of the building and car park, which is not wide enough for vehicles and pedestrians, the current lease from the Diocese, disabled access and the wide range of repairs needed to bring the hall up to modern standards compliant with current regulations.

Money so far accrued from the Parish Council (£45,000) and the Village Hall funds (£13,000) will not be enough to cover all the items in the 'wish list' but we might be able to access grant funding from various sources if we aim for an eco friendly facility, making use of modern technology and renewable resources wherever possible.

We are very fortunate to have a wide variety of skills available to us from within the village. A working group has been set up (John Scott, Graham Healey and James Field) to do preliminary investigations and put forward design proposals. They will report back to the main committee towards the end of January. Gina Snowden

Take control of your driving future

Older motorists have a wealth of experience, confidence and tolerance. However sight, reaction times, judgement of speed and distance won't be as sharp as they once were. Fragility increases with age, so injuries tend to be more serious and recovery takes longer and the chance of surviving an accident is much lower.

The County Council's **Older Driver Skills Scheme** aims to find ways of helping older people drive safely for as long as they are fit to do so, rather than taking measures to prevent them from driving at all. It's ideal for people who've been driving for years and want to update their skills or gain confidence; those recovering from illness or injury; those advised on health grounds; people returning to driving or finding it difficult to adapt to a new car.

What does it inv olve? It's not a test — there's no pass/fail. Instead it's an informal, confidential appraisal aiming to offer help and advice, which will enable that person to continue driving with improved safety. General ability is assessed but particular concerns can be investigated. Each person is given a comprehensive debrief and any concerns or remedial action discussed, a written report follows. A current driving licence is required and eyesight is checked. The appraisal costs £25 and is delivered from the person's home, using their own car.

Road safety officers manage the award winning scheme with appraisals delivered by Driving Standards Agency (DSA) Approved Driving Instructors (ADI's). For further information or to arrange an appraisal please contact Hampshire's Road Safety Team on 01962 874600.

Open Spaces



Thanks very much to everyone who helped at the Village Clean Up Day. The stream was cleared and the pedestrian entrance to the village hall car park and the gravel area by the church were improved. A huge amount of work was done by our hard-working volunteers who filled a large skip kindly donated by Purbeck Bins Ltd (part of the Raymond Brown Group).

East Aston Common

You will recollect that Mr & Mrs Tacchi of Hurstbourne Estate have been considering whether to lodge an application to extinguish common rights over approximately 20 acres of common land at East Aston Common (mainly comprising river bank, bed and islands). In exchange they would grant new common rights over approximately 33 acres of cow pasture (known as Nether Regions and Bank) in the parish of Hurstbourne Priors on the East side of the B3048 to the East of East Aston. As part of the pre-application process they have consulted various bodies including the parish councils in Longparish and Hurstbourne Priors, the Test Valley and Basingstoke and Deane Borough Councils, Hampshire County Council, the Open Spaces Society and Natural England.

The two parish councils formed a working group which has considered the idea very carefully and taken soundings among local people. The group concluded that there was no support for the proposal and that there are many good grounds for believing that the Secretary of State would not approve an application. Briefly they are that

- The proposal is not in the public interest or the interest of the neighbourhood.
- The proposal does not safeguard the diversity and variety of common land.
- Public access and conservation on the common are not incompatible.
- The land adjoins other common land and thus forms part of a larger area of common land which will be devalued if the application is accepted.
- The land has a long history as common land going back many centuries.

We understand that other consultees do not support the proposal.

We are therefore pleased to report that Mr & Mrs Tacchi have decided to put the idea on hold for the time being

while they consider alternative approaches to balancing the interests of nature conservation and public amenity. We will keep you informed of future developments.

Footpaths

Thanks very much to Ricky Bourne for the brushcutter course, to Liz for the excellent cake and to students, Phil Harris, Patrick Beresford and Matt Denny who are now qualified to use the parish machines.

There was a long discussion about Dr David Wright's proposal to move footpath 12 in the Christmas Tree Field. The full range of views has been reported to the County Council.

The council has bid successfully for grants from the County Council to re-print our popular Longparish footpaths leaflet and put up small direction signs to help people on the walks in the leaflet with route finding.

Planning

The council had no objection to

- A side extension at River Barn Cottage
- Tree works at Owls Lodge, Forton

Conservation Area

The Borough Council is reviewing the Conservation Area and will be proposing modest revisions. These will be explained at a public exhibition on Monday 19 January from 2 - 8pm in the village hall. Your input is important. Please come. More information next month.

Transport Update

A revised Bus and Train Travel Guide for Andover & North West Hampshire is available free in the Village Shop. It contains bus and train timetables for this area including the Cango C4 and Stagecoach 26 buses that serve Longparish. The only change noted is that the 16.35 Stagecoach 26 from Andover now departs 10 minutes later at 16.45.

Cango Bookings (0845 602 4135)

The Cango C4 timetable is unchanged. There have been problems with booked passengers not being collected by the Cango service. In many cases this was due to problems with the call centre that takes the bookings and the communication between the call centre and the Cango driver; this is being addressed and is improving.

However, it is advisable to book as early as possible to ensure bookings reach the bus before it departs, rather than trying to book once it is on route. In the morning the call centre opens at 08.00. The bus doesn't leave Barton Stacey till 09.05 but please don't leave it that late to call. The call centre is very busy at this time, taking bookings for all the Cango services in the area, so it is advisable to book the previous day.

Thumbs-up to new Library

If you are in school do come along and have a look at our newly refurbished Library and Study Zone, opened by the Mayor and Mayoress of Whitchurch on November 5th. The new layout and furniture, decoration, blinds and computer area have had a Tardis-like effect, with some pupils convinced the room has actually been enlarged. Their responses have included "cool", "modern" and "awesome" so I think we can judge the improvements to be a big success. We owe huge thanks to our PTFA who raised over £10,000 towards the refurbishment.

Half-term also saw the completion of the works begun in the summer holidays, with decoration of the Scola Block corridors and Dining Room, which also had new lights and ceilings. Keeping the school in smart order and repair has a touch of the Forth Bridge about it but we are delighted with all the improvements, which have given us a much more attractive working environment. Now we have to start planning on how to get the Main Block up to the same standard!
