Responsible dog walkers

Dog walking does a huge amount of good. People who walk dogs are far more likely to meet government exercise targets of at least half an hour at least 5 times a week. Walking your dog is a sociable activity. You meet other dog owners and people who like your pet. Dog walking helps keep our paths in order and many dog walkers pick up litter and report problems to landowners. But there's a downside as well. Some dog owners allow their dogs to leave mess or to disturb livestock and wildlife and do not appreciate that some people who use paths can be frightened of dogs and dread the words, "He's only playing".

By law, you must control your dog so that it does not scare or disturb farm animals or wildlife. Your dog has



every right to be on a footpath but there's no right to roam on the surrounding farm land. Please take particular care that your dog doesn't scare sheep and lambs. There have been some regrettable incidents with the sheep on

The Newton and the fields beyond. The rare Manx Loghtan sheep are in lamb and particularly vulnerable at this time of year. No-one wants it to happen but you should be aware that farmers are entitled to destroy a dog that injures or worries their animals.

The nesting season is approaching so please don't allow your dog to wander where it might disturb birds that nest on the ground and other wildlife – eggs and young will soon die without protection from their parents.

Everyone knows how unpleasant dog mess is and it can cause infections. There has been a particular problem with dog mess on and near the path from Forton to the school recently and on the pavement near the school. Mothers who make the daily trip to school try to keep their toddlers out of it but they don't always succeed. So please always clean up after your dog and get rid of the mess re sponsibly. You can put bagged dog mess in the green wheelie bin by the school turning area.

Sadly the irresponsible few can damage the reputation of all dog owners. If you, as a responsible dog walker, see others behaving irresponsibly please have a word with them.

Longparish Parish Council

This report covers the December meeting and meetings of the Open Spaces, Finance and Communications committees. Minutes of meetings are in the parish council area on the village website: www.longparish.org.uk.

Open Spaces

Paul Knipe is planning to do some tree work on the pocket nature reserve at The Common on 28 February and would welcome volunteers to help. Please see separate article.

The next Clean Up Day will be on Saturday 18 April. Please reserve the date.

Estimates are being obtained for repairs to the skate ramp. The Council also plans to repaint the equipment in the playground this year.

Footpaths

Thanks very much to the working party who have removed the metal kissing gate at the church to enable mothers with buggies to go through the churchyard on the way to school and playgroup.

Finance

The council agreed its budget for next year and decided to keep the precept (the amount householder pay as part of the Council tax) unchanged.

Conservation Area

Over 50 people came to the public exhibition. If you would like to comment the documents are available on the village website. The deadline is 20 February.

Planning

The council had no objection to replacement windows at Westhay, Forton.

Upper Mill Ford Public Inquiry

The Inspector decided that there is no public right of way over the old ford just downstream of Upper Mill. This decision is what the council had been seeking because of concerns over the impact on the environment if the old ford had been opened to off-road vehicles.

School Admissions Policy

Mrs Mehaffey, chairman of the Governors explained that all schools are consulting about their admissions policy. The council is concerned that the way the system operates denies places at Longparish School to some children who move into the catchment area after the normal November deadline for admission the following September. The result is that they have to travel to other schools even though fewer than half the children using the school come from the catchment area, which includes Longparish and Hurstbourne Priors. The same problem arises with other popular schools. The council decided to write to David Kirk, the HCC Education portfolio holder, an action which is supported by our local HCC councillor, Michael Woodhall.

In response to a query raised at the meeting, Mrs Mehaffey has since advised that, when there is room, after school clubs at the School will be open to such children to enable them to have greater contact with their peers from the village. If you are interested please contact the school on 720317.

The next parish council meeting is on Monday 9 February. Meetings are public. Parishioners are welcome to come and can speak by invitation.
