Longparish School

Business and Enterprise week

During the last week of the half term, Year 5 and 6 immersed themselves in a Business and Enterprise week in order to raise funds for our link school, Bukanaga, in Uganda. Groups were given a budget to develop a product for sale, with the aim of making a profit. The class received input from two governors, who had backgrounds in business and finance. From their initial business ideas, they were taken on a step by step journey through research, design, financial planning, production, presentation and marketing. The project culminated in a sale of the end products, which, at the time of writing, the class were working towards. We wait to see if we have any budding entrepreneurs!

Thinking Skills

Earlier this year, we introduced Philosophy for Children (P4C) into the curriculum, which aims to encourage children to think critically, caringly, creatively and collaboratively. This has helped us to build a 'community of enquiry' where participants create and enquire into their own questions, and 'learn how to learn' in the process.

The children are continuing to develop their thinking skills through various techniques, including de Bono's Six Thinking Hats and Thinking Maps. The depth of thinking that the children display, was commented on by both Ofsted and SIAS inspectors.

As part of their work on habitats and the environment, Years 1 and 2 visited Hillier Gardens in May. The following report is written by Ellie Nicholson in Year 2:

Roads

The parish council has recently asked again asked for the 30 limit to extend to Southside Farm and to the Forton bus shelter. There have been some changes in other villages recently, for example the 30 limit in Wherwell now goes right to Cottonworth, so maybe the authorities will be more receptive.

Planning

The County Council has given permission for a noise reducing bund on the side of the **shooting ground** nearest the village. The parish council has long taken the line that there should be such a bund to protect the village.

Following a very helpful and informative visit to the **woodchip plant at** Pachington the Council considered an application for a Pollution Prevention and Control Permit. The matter is very technical and the Council does not have expert advice on this issue so it came to the conclusion that it will have to rely on the expert knowledge of TVBC officers and advisers to reconcile the interests of local residents at Longparish Station and in the village itself, the environment, including the Harewood Forest Site for Important Nature Conservation, the SSSI of the river Test, and the operator.

The outcome of the Public Inquiry about the mobile home at **Testwood Trout Farm** was that the Inspector refused permission. However, the matter is not yet final as the applicant has appealed to the High Court.

Pump House near The Plough

Following some technical problems at the sewage pumping station in April, there has been a great deal of maintenance activity involving repairs to pumps and well cleaning. If you would like more information please contact Christopher Duxbury (tel 720580)

With the ground once again beginning to sparkle in the spring sunshine outdoor cricket is once again underway at Longparish.

Hill & Valley

The Longparish Longhops finishing in a respectable mid table position. The U15s were crowned champions after an unbeaten campaign in the North Hampshire Harmison indoor league.

Congratulations to William de Cani and Brad Aldridge who have both been selected for the final Winchester & District squad to play in the U15 Festivals which are this year held at New Milton, particularly as both are U14s, and to Billy Mead for inclusion in the U10 squad to play in the festivals at Lord Wandsworth College.

The U11s got the outdoor season underway with an impressive twenty run victory at Hedge End, Captain Billy Mead and Scott Sturt shining with the bat. Jamie Blackmore outstanding in his first game behind the timbers, Tom Carter and Matthew Hewitt kept the pressure on in the field while Dan Bearpark took the first wicket to fall backed up by some superb bowling by Harry Samways. Billy Mead capping a great all round performance with two match winning catches.

The U15s started their campaign with an impressive win at Ropley, Ben Gardner and Brad Aldridge starring with the bat, William Jackman and Alex Coetzee impressing with the ball.

Senior team cricket broke out early in the month with an inter club match and a brace of friendlies against Amport and Romsey. The first competitive match, the opening round of The Village Cup was a close affair against Burridge in which Longparish came close to causing an upset against a team playing two divisions above.

The First team started their County Div 3 campaign at home to St Cross III, Chris Clarke 4 for 33 and Adam Seidman 3 for 44 the pick of the bowling as St Cross were dismissed for 151. Longparish put on fifty before losing wickets at regular intervals, Paul Blackmore and Ross Stewart scoring the bulk of the runs as the target was reached with seven wickets down and seven overs to spare.

The second team got off to a flyer in NW Div 3 beating Ampfield II by 158 runs. 14 year old opener William de Cani scoring his maiden hundred and carrying his bat to finish on 143 not out, 17yr old Matt Jackman 56 not out as Longparish II posted 281 for 2. A youthful Longparish II attack limiting Ampfield II to 123 for 6 from their 42 overs.

In their second game against Bramshaw II, Longparish II were indebted to lower order runs from James Young 34 and Steve Benco 20 in tricky batting conditions as Longparish II were dismissed for 160. A superb display in the field restricting Bramshaw II who finished seven runs short of the target.
