The main dish at the main event!



Each night, during the screening of the initial heat and the finals week, diners at The Plough Inn were given the opportunity to eat the dishes designed for the series whilst watching the programme on screens set up in the restaurant. James was available for questions and critique! A fabulous idea and a great way for everyone to sample the dishes being prepared before their very eyes and share the highs and lows of a very competitive and entertaining show.

James' winning dish entitled 'Blitz Spirit' wowed the judges, attaining top marks all round. The dish, a sharing platter of roasted veal loin, braised veal cheeks, sautéed sweetbreads, beans, mushrooms and toast has since been added to the menu at The Plough Inn.



James said, "It was an incredibly humbling experience and a massive honour to know that I would be able to commemorate D-Day and WWII and to thank the veterans. My wife's grandfather fought throughout the war and was also one of the first to land on the beaches on D-Day. When designing the dishes for the programme I spent a long time talking to my wife's grandmother to find out what food was available during the war, what food they liked and what food they would dream about."

James has worked incredibly hard since moving in to The Plough with his family in March 2012 and his success in this competition has meant that bookings are now being made as far in advance as October! Congratulations James!

Report from meeting held on 9 June

Open Forum - Flooding

Before starting its routine business, the Council conducted a public meeting on the issues arising from this winter's flooding. This was attended by 10 members of the public and 3 representatives from Southern Water. The discussion at the meeting was based on the Council's 'Notes on Longparish Flooding', which are available on the web-site. The paper emphasises the different roles of the 3 main agencies involved: HCC – surface water drainage, groundwater management and

highways; TVBC – road-sweeping, response coordination and planning policy; and Southern Water – waste water management and groundwater infiltration.

After a review of the overall lessons to be learned, Southern Water outlined the actions that they had already put in train: a survey of the main sewer where it had not been re-lined, a review of the pumping station opposite the Plough Inn, and an infiltration reduction plan. Progress on these would be reported to the Parish Council. This was followed by an open session during which a number of points were raised on such issues as; the importance of local knowledge, the over-reliance on remote telemetry, the need for regular maintenance, and the requirement for the sewer to be 'jetted' through.

Planning

The Council had no objection in principle to: Permitted Development at Vale Farm, Nuns' Walk. However, concerns would be raised with TVBC about the lack of information supplied with the application to facilitate a decision on the siting and appearance of the proposed building.

Other Planning Matters

The meeting of the A303 Recycling Facility Liaison Group had been very informative, and confirmed the impression of the strict controls under which the site was operated – a recent Environment Agency inspection had, for example, revealed no examples of non-conformance with regulations. The next meeting would be held in September, and, in the meantime, Raymond Brown would be continuing to discuss the details of the dust control scheme for the IBAA (incinerator bottom ash aggregate) plant with the owners of the adjacent solar farm.

Finance

The Council agreed the 2013/2014 Accounts and Notes and the Annual Return, and these would now be subject to Internal and External Audit.

Open Spaces

The 'wok' roundabout in the children's playground had now been repaired, thanks to Wayne Sykes. The football pitch was being cut every 2 weeks.

Highways

The first list of jobs had been submitted to the Parish Lengthsman contractor, and consideration would be given to additional requirements.

Communications

The new version of the village web-site was scheduled to go live shortly. Any material that was not transferred would be available through a link to the archived version of the current web-site.

Next Parish Council Meeting

The next Parish Council meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Monday 14 July. Parish Council meetings are public, and parishioners are also welcome to speak on specific agenda items by prior arrangement with the Chairman – Jonathan Frere (tel: 720574, or email: clerk@longparish.org.uk).

The Longparish men who made the ultimate sacrifice – just who were they?

Each year on Armistice Day the names of the first war dead engraved on the Longparish war memorial are read aloud to ensure they their sacrifices are not forgotten. Now villagers are being asked to help discover more about who they were and how they died. The research is being carried out by Henry Yelf and Jo Webb. They plan to display the results at a memorial concert in St. Nicholas' Church on November 14th to mark one hundred years since the start of the Great War.

Henry Yelf said "We have already uncovered some fascinating facts. Some of the information is very moving." In one case a Padre writing from the front to the parents of their dead soldier son describes how he was shot, apparently protecting another man from the fatal bullet. Research has also revealed that the Wedge family who lived in Malthouse Cottage lost two sons to the war. "As time goes on they become just names on a memorial. We want to make sure they become more than that in the minds of local people"

Henry and Jo are anxious to trace descendants of Great War servicemen named on the memorial or anyone who has information about them. They particularly want to borrow or copy photographs, citations, letters home and any other relevant memorabilia. They realise these items may be of great sentimental value and promise to treat them with every care.

The 28 names they are researching are Francis Jearrad Bowker, Charles Bowley, Albert (Henry) Brackstone, George Brackstone, Albert Burgess, Charles Edward Burrows, William Challis, George Thomas Griffith Clark, William Victor Dobson, Henry French, Frederick George Goater, Leonard Charles Goodyear, William Albert Goulding, Alfred Tom Gradidge, Lanoe George Hawker, Edward Hounsome, Alfred William Locke, Cecil Percy Fred Mills, William John Poore, Thomas Charles Langford Read, Arthur Smith, Charles Thomas Smith, Walter Tubb, Charles Turton, Edward James Wedge, Leonard George Wedge, Arthur Wesson, Edward Parker Wilkinson.

William James Brunson

21 March 1929 - 29 May 2014

Basingstoke crematorium was packed for the funeral of Bill Brunson, whose granddaughter, Kath Clay paid the following tribute.



"I would like to tell you all about Bill, Brunny, Big Jake, Dad, Grandad - who, by all accounts was a fine figure of a man, if he did say so himself - which he did. Usually, so I'm told, first thing in the morning, whilst admiring his reflection in the mirror.

Grandad was born on 21st March 1929 in Appleshaw. When he was 6 he moved with his parents and brothers Cecil and Addy to the Folly in Harewood. His father Ted was the gamekeeper on the estate and regularly Grandad and his brothers would go out poaching his father's pheasants to give to the milkman as trade for a lift down to Hurstbourne Priors to school, instead of the long walk from home. He continued to refine his poaching skills when he was 9, as the family had moved into the village of Longparish, round Mill Lane, where tickling trout was now the favourite pastime.

Grandad started working for Ernie Englefield in the coal yard and farm when he was 12. At 14 he left school and went to work full time for Ernie, where he stayed until 1958.

He met Nan in Barton Stacey in 1954, after she missed the bus home one day and was cheeky enough to cadge a lift from him. They married in January 1956 and Grandad, obviously being a true romantic, took her back to live in his caravan in his father's garden and then later on an idyllic scrap of wasteland near Blacksmiths Bridge, where they stayed for their first two years of married life.

Their son Stephen was born in 1958, and a month later the family moved to the Peak on Apsley Estate and Grandad started work on the farm there. Their daughter Sue, was born 3 years later and they stayed at Apsley for 7 ½ years in total. Many times over the years we have heard how Grandad managed to get the first cab put on any of the tractors at Apsley, after coming home one winter's day with his overcoat frozen on him. He had to stand in front of the Rayburn to thaw out before any of his layers could be removed.

When the family left Apsley they moved to 2 Cricket Field Cottages, Longparish and Grandad started working on the farm for Middleton Estate, where he stayed until 1992. After being made redundant, he continued to work for the Wills family in Middleton House gardens until he was 78, finally retiring in 2007

As most of you will know, he spent just as much, if not more time, working in his own garden. The flower beds and vegetable plots were the talk of the village.

He could turn his hand to most things and make almost anything, whether it was DIY, wooden toys for us kids, or his extensively large collection of homemade wines and liqueurs; his wine tasting sessions were always a hit with us grandkids. Similarly, Grandad loved his food, any

excuse to have the family all together for a 'bit of a do', dinner out or a BBQ.

Grandad loved his country field sports and many a summer he would spend up the harvest field watching for Charlie, but in true Grandad style, he would normally be told by Dad or whoever drove the combine that the foxes were running all ways whilst he sat fast asleep on his stool, completely oblivious. It's been a family joke that he could fall asleep anywhere, even on the washing line. Even after he gave up shooting, he still continued to be an important part of the shoot day by driving the game cart for Apsley and Middleton.

In the last few years, with his health deteriorating and mobility limited he still managed to keep himself busy, whether it was hiding from Nan up the shed, trying to keep out of trouble, or pottering about the garden, a sight I'm sure we all shall miss.

On behalf of Nan, I would like to thank all who have sent cards and their best wishes. One thing that many of you wrote, that I think sums him up perfectly was that Grandad was a 'True Country Gentleman', and I think that is the best way to remember him."

BIRDS OF LONGPARISH**THE CUCKOO**

The cuckoo is the bird everyone waits to hear in the spring. It's another of our birds in decline. When I was a lad (long time ago) the cuckoo was calling all day long; now it's only now and again. To see if they could find

out why, the British Trust for Ornithology has been trapping them and fitting tiny satellite transmitters to their backs, which send out a signal once a day. The BTO has found they spend the winter in Africa in the rain forest of the Congo. What is interesting is that they don't all take the same route there; some fly down over France and Spain then down the west side of Africa. Some fly down to Italy and then down the east side, and others fly straight across the Sahara. Last year it was a cold spring so one of the cuckoos flew back to France for a bit of warmth (we would all like to do that).

The cuckoo is about the same size as a dove, blue-grey above and grey-white and barred below, with a long tail, yellow legs and eyes with a black iris. It looks very similar to a kestrel when flying so some birds think they are raptors. It arrives in April and will start looking for a host for its eggs. The cuckoo is a parasite and lays one egg in each nest it finds. It will take one egg out and eat it, then lay one in its place. The egg is very similar in size and colour to the others in the nest. Reed warblers and dunnocks are the favourite hosts but it has been recorded using over 100 different nests. When the egg hatches the baby will evict all the other eggs or chicks, by using the hollow in its back to push the egg up the side of the nest and out. The baby cuckoo has a ravenous appetite and the host parents will work all day long feeding it. It takes up to six weeks to fledge, by that time the hosts will stand on its back to feed it. The parent cuckoo has nothing to do with the young. It's thought a cuckoo lays up to twenty eggs. The old saying is right - the cuckoo comes in April, sings its song in May and then it flies away. When the young cuckoo is ready to migrate the adults have already left so it has to find its way to Africa by itself. How does it know where to go?

Their main food is hairy caterpillars which other birds don't like. To eat them it bites the head off and shakes the insides out, which makes them okay to eat. The picture of the cuckoo is not one of mine (pity).

We did not have any baby lapwings in the pony paddock this year. I think this could be due to wheat being grown in the field behind which is very thick, so they might have nested in the tram lines and been run over during spraying.

Another problem is dog mess. The worst places are the road from Lower Mill bridge to the ford and the bottom end of the spinal path. I get fed up having to clean it off my mobility scooter. Not only that, children walk the spinal path to school. It is illegal not to pick it up and you can be fined £1000.

A poor month for newly promoted Longparish I saw two games cancelled and two narrow defeats, the first away at Bransgore, where a side affected by illness, injury and bereavement was narrowly beaten by 13 runs, the second at home to Bedhampton where Longparish put in a superb performance but again fell short by 13 runs. Longparish II also lost two games to the weather but enjoyed success at home to Littleton & Westhill, in which Bob Sturt rolled back the years with an eye catching 43 in a 32 run win. A 6 wicket defeat at Odiham followed in which Gary Taplin carried his bat for 28. Longparish IIIs notched back to back wins over Whitchurch II and Crown Taverners II. U15 Harry Samways starred with the ball in both with 3 wickets for 8 runs and 4 wickets for 4 runs.

Longparish U15 are flying after four wins out of four, with cup success over Andover U15A and Compton & Chandlers Ford U1. Hursley Park U15 were Longparish U15s quarter final opponents, Scott Sturt 27 and Dan Bearpark 26 gave the Longparish innings a superb start and an unbeaten 23 from Rory Kerr set Hursley Park a target of 106 which they failed to reach by 22 runs with Harry Samways taking 3 for 7. Longparish U15 are away in the semi final against St Cross U15A on the 29th June. Longparish U13 also enjoyed cup success with a win over Trojans U13, but defeat followed in the quarter final at Compton & Chandlers Ford U13. In the league against St Cross U13A Callum Giles hit an impressive 30 but could not prevent his side falling to a six wicket defeat, but runs for William Samways, 30 Jordan Blackmore, 31 Luke Benzing, 10 and Hamish Janaway 13 and wickets for Alex Bundy, Bailey Sampson-Bridgen Jack Soper and Cameron Proctor secured a 66 run win over IBM Hursley U13. Longparish U11 have also impressed. Against Andover U11 Louis Perreira hit an unbeaten 25 and Harry Cardno opened both the batting and bowling, hitting 13 runs and taking 3 wickets. At Bishops Waltham, Liam Whitehorn, Ben Wills and Ben Arnold picked up wickets and Alfie Smith briefly threatened to rip through the Bishops Waltham tail as they closed on 108 for 4. Daniel Parkyn hit an impressive unbeaten 30 in the Longparish reply that finished 7 runs short of their target.

The 20/20 midweek cricket schedule has been trashed by the weather, although the Tichborne Trophy is well underway. Longparish, the beaten finalists of two years ago, face a tricky tie with SPL side Hursley Park in the quarter final. Sunday friendly fixtures have also been intermittent, but those games that have taken place have provided useful experience of the longer format of the game for many colts along with an opportunity for more senior players to pay out former glories.

On Monday 14th July, Longparish will be playing Australia, albeit the Australia over 60s side. A fun bunch who played to quite a high level, quite a few years ago, they are touring the area and rang up for a game. All welcome on the day to watch what could be quite a difficult game to call.
